belonging—a HOME. I got to know Julia and could see how much Jan loved her and wanted the best for this little one. As a mum myself, I felt drawn to offer my help to Jan because of the compassion I felt in my heart and to aid her in her tireless work in my own small way.

At the moment I take care of Julia while Jan attends meetings regarding future developments at Casa Mea and visits other babies at the orphanage. She hopes another baby will be 'out' and in her care in the not too distant future.

I have great admiration for Jan and what Casa Mea is trying to achieve.

# By Murray

I came to work at Casa Mea this January because the challenge of the variety of work to be done fascinated me. With so many interesting projects to be tackled it was most frustrating to be suddenly hit by the raw chill of winter. This made it impossible to work at the house for more than a couple of hours before frozen fingers, ears, and nose forced a 'down tools' situation and it was dangerous to use power tools which required holding in hands that had lost their feeling.



Fortunately for me, by the time I joined in the work at the house a lot of basic preparation work had been completed and the building had started to take shape. Knowing that there are teams of volunteers with skills and muscle due to arrive in the spring, it is a priority to prepare facilities to accommodate them. Due to the necessity of conserving funds, all timber used to make things is being reclaimed from rough hewn wood which was used for building shuttering. The temptation to burn it on occasions to extract the warmth is almost overwhelming.

The project is, from an engineering point of view, at that lovely interesting stage where everything is about ready to take off. Using little imagination, I can hear the babies yelling, see children charging about and laughing, smell the kitchen, hear the cook moaning (why do cooks enjoy a good moan?) and us having a good laugh getting five year olds to tread grapes to make the wine.

I am thankful for the opportunity to participate in this worthwhile project.

On Saturday, October 1, 2005 at 7:30 pm at the Auditorium Theatre located at 885 East Main Street in Rochester, New York the BeatleMania Now group will perform. The show is presented by Casa Mea and all net proceeds will be donated to Casa Mea.

Hi, I'm Kevin Calos and have been a supporter of Casa Mea since its inception. I've spent a bit of time trying to figure out how I can help support Casa Mea financially. Well, here is my story.

I attended a fundraiser in my small hometown located in western New York State. The event was to support a local volunteer fire department. The group performing was BeatleMania Now. The theater was packed; people were rocking and rolling, singing and clapping. The place was pandemonium and I loved it! Apparently plenty of others felt the same way. This was the third straight year of a sell out for the same event by the same BeatleMania Now in this small town at the same old movie theater.

I walked out and thought to myself what a great event for Casa Mea. I've got to find a theater in another town and do this. A year later I attended a show at the Auditorium Theatre in Rochester, New York some 60 miles from my hometown. The moment I walked in I knew this was the place for the Casa Mea presentation of BeatleMania Now. The theatre houses several Broadway plays like The Lion King, Peter Pan and Evita and a variety of other shows like Bill Cosby and Lord of the Dance just to name a few.

I contacted the BeatleMania Now group and got a couple of dates from them. I then contacted the Auditorium Theatre and got a date from them. I was on my way. The Theatre will take care of the advertising with newspapers, community publications and several local radio stations. I will have tickets available for the radio stations to give away to listeners. Ticketmaster will have tickets on sale via telephone and the Internet. Tickets will also be available at the Theatre's box office, which is open every day.

The Theatre seats 2,464 in three distinct areas. Ticket pricing is aligned with the seating. Orchestra seats are \$27.50, Mezzanine seats are \$24.50 and Balcony seats are \$22.50.

Upon entering the Auditorium everyone will receive a Casa Mea brochure. The show is 2 hours with a 20-minute intermission. During the intermission just before the show starts again, we will make an announcement about Casa Mea and all the good work it is accomplishing. There will also be a slide presentation with Casa Mea scenes during the announcement. In the lobby, a table will be set up and we will be accepting donations.

There is still much to be done to get ready for the big night. Join us if you can. If you can't make it, buy a ticket and donate it back to Casa Mea. Thanks.

# **JULIA'S STORY**

Today Julia is a healthy happy toddler. She wakes up every morning smiling and smiles constantly throughout the day. All who meet her are instantly taken in by her smile and her charm. If you pick her up, she is likely to lay her head on your shoulder and snuggle in for a good cuddle. She is perfectly content to play by herself and more often than not you will find her singing away at the top of her lungs. Julia loves to eat and will do a little jig as soon as

she sees the food coming. Would you believe she prefers spicy foods to sweet foods? To her, cookies are just toys to play with. But potato chips are another matter! She practically inhales them.

Julia was not always healthy and happy. For the first five months that she was in the infant orphanage, she did not

smile. She did not sing or play or cuddle. All she did day after day was lie on her back in her crib. At five months, she could not lie on her tummy. She could not roll over. She could not hold her bottle or eat from a spoon. She did not even make sounds. Unfortunately, Julia's stay in the orphanage was like that of Catalin's and many other babies confined there.



# CATALIN'S STORY

Catalin arrived at the infant orphanage almost a year ago at the age of 2 weeks. Like Julia, Catalin was underweight and very sick. He spent day after day on his back in his crib. He cried almost constantly. This is Catalin at 6 months of age. It may appear that Catalin has a fat little tummy but those are just several rags underneath his sleeper. The rags were his diaper for the day! Obviously, Catalin was in dire need of a home where he would have lots of love and attention.

Casa Mea wanted to give Catalin such a home where he would thrive as Julia has. But Catalin did not get such a home. Today he is not a happy healthy toddler. His story does not have a happy ending as Julia's does. Although Casa Mea made its first of many requests to get Catalin out of the orphanage when he was a month old, these requests were ignored. Instead, the authorities here simply asked

when the house in Prejmer would be ready. The obvious but unstated answer is that Casa Mea will get no more children until the house is completely renovated.

# YOU CAN HELP

We are trying desperately to complete the house so that we can give 10 to 12 unwanted and unloved children like Julia and Catalin a home where they will never feel unwanted or unloved again. We want to give them a home where they will grow and thrive and develop into happy, well adjusted children. Although many of you have helped us in the past to achieve this goal, the house is still not completed and we still need your financial help. We need approximately \$75,000 to complete all the renovations. This amount includes a new roof, new thermopane windows, and a central heating system. We hope that you can find it within your heart to continue to help us. However, we do realize that at this time many people in the gulf coast area of the US are also in need of your help. Whatever you can do for either of these victims, we would be eternally grateful.

**VOLUNTEER'S VIEW** by Natalie Trewinnard, an 18 year old English woman.

I have been to Romania 3 times with my Church's charity, C.R.Y (Care and Relief for the Young). Through our first visit in the summer of 2003, I met Jan who showed us around the infant orphanage in Brasov, where I fell in love with the little children. My heart goes out to those little ones and I think about them often; they all need love and care. So when I heard of Jan's plans for Casa Mea I wanted to do all I could to help. There is a great need for this work.



Naturally, I went to Casa Mea wanting to make a big difference straight away, but I soon found out that its the little jobs that are often the most useful; the jobs that would probably be left to the last minute but needed to be done. I worked in the garden mostly in the summer of 2004 and broke up concrete for floor foundations. We came back at Easter 2005 with a whole group from our Church. This time we brought a work force of our own! I de-tiled a bathroom with a chisel and hammer at the expense of my wrist for a few days. We had an electrician with us who wired up part of the house. I also aided in carpentry for a wood box and a compost bin while the rest of the work team sanded old paint off the walls. The work at Casa Mea is as hard or as easy as you want to make it. I just wish I could have been there for longer and had more useful skills.

My experience in volunteering has had a positive impact on me. It has given me the opportunity to serve where there is no glamour but the heart of people to touch. I was looking ahead to the brilliant work that Casa Mea will achieve and I felt privileged to be involved in this new movement to help the unloved children because that is all they really need and I know they will receive it at Casa Mea.
